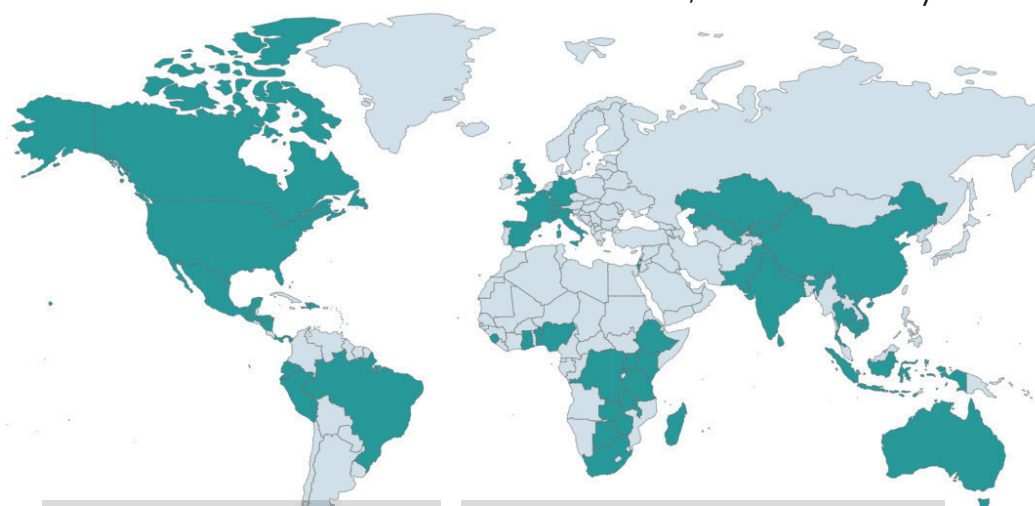

An internationally recognized epidemiologist who has worked on the front lines of HIV/AIDS and COVID-19 treatment and research, Chris Beyrer serves as the Gary Hock Distinguished Professor in Global Health at the Duke University School of Medicine. Beyrer is past president of the International AIDS Society, the world's largest body of HIV professionals, and currently serves as an advisor to the U.S. President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), the HIV Vaccine Trials Network, the World Health Organization and Physicians for Human Rights.
